FMC FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS: HELPING AT MANY LEVELS

The FMC Foundation administers and oversees two scholarship programs, the Morgan Siskiyou Foundation and the Robert Jackson Memorial Scholarship. These programs help provide ongoing efforts to improve services and the overall healthcare delivery system through assisting and encouraging educational opportunities to hospital employees.

Our hospital is constantly challenged to build, maintain and support a professional level of services for our patients, but there is another obvious element to the far-reaching value of scholarship awards, and that is the impact on the lives of the recipients themselves. Educational opportunities build morale, increase motivation and stimulate thought, change and enthusiasm. These scholarship opportunities are aimed at furthering the possibilities of locals to ultimately stay local, not only to improve the quality of services here, but also to help prevent waste of valuable human Christine continued to desire further involvement within the hospital with patient care, and realized that what she really aspired to was to become a Registered Nurse. This path required much education and years of endeavor to achieve, and at times it seemed almost an impossible goal given costs, time involvements and her very real life obligations.

She was encouraged to apply for a Morgan Scholarship, which she was awarded, to pursue her dream of becoming a nurse.

Christine says, "The hospital has backed me 120%. They have helped me in so many ways, offered so many encouragements, so many have voluntarily mentored me, helped and guided me. The scholarship opportunity from the Morgans has changed my life, and I don't know how to express my gratitude. I have been able to get somewhere, my self confidence, my self esteem, from where I was to where I am..."

Chris goes on to say, "I am here to stay. This is like a family to me. It is this hospital I want to be in and where I will be. While it is not always easy, I love my work, and the thing I most enjoy is feeling appreciated, knowing I have really helped my patients."

The other scholarship program at FMC is the Dr. Robert Jackson Memorial Scholarship, established in 2002 by the late Twila Hughes-Jackson in memory of the late Dr. Jackson, an orthopedic surgeon. This scholarship is specifically offered to FMC employees involved in "direct patient care," such as nurses, respiratory therapists, rehabilitation therapists, laboratory technicians, or radiology/imaging personnel.

Lauralee Wallace, PT (Physical Therapist) a long-time employee of FMC Rehabilitation, saw a need, and applied for a Jackson Scholarship award to attend a recent two day conference in Portland OR. This was a continuing education course for Physical Therapists to learn the latest information for treating injuries to lower limbs in athletes. Lauralee comments that the Rehabilitation department of FMC sees a broad gamut of injuries and problems, and treatment modalities are constantly changing and evolving. She said, "this was a fantastic course, and it made a huge impact on my comfort level treating this type of injury which involves complicated structures, particularly in the young athletes that we so typically see in our practice. I am very grateful to have received the scholarship and to gain new information and knowledge to share with my colleagues."

resources and abilities. Most of the recipients of these scholarships have been able to keep working at their jobs and be with their families while accomplishing their educational goals. Not only does this represent personal gain for the individuals involved; our community on the whole benefits from the increase in skill and knowledge of the hospital employees.

Bert and Paula Morgan established the Morgan Siskiyou Foundation at Fairchild Medical Center in 1999. The Morgans are philanthropists who have a passionate interest in helping to provide educational opportunities for persons living and working in this area. They have given generously through the years to many different educational and community-based causes, and they have had a particular interest in promoting excellence in health care in the rural areas.

Christine Crownover, RN, is an outstanding example of the spirit of the Morgan Scholarship in the health care field. She worked at FMC for 20 years in the hospital laboratory as a full-time phlebotomist; she loved working with patients and being part of the hospital. She realized she wanted to do more, go farther, have greater involvement...and during these years she has certainly done so. She began by becoming an EMT I (emergency medical technician), continued her training in that area through COS, achieving EMT II status, and then spent every weekend for six months in Humboldt county to become certified as a Paramedic. She worked during these periods for Yreka, Mt. Shasta and Etna ambulance services, all the while continuing her full time employment in the FMC lab and raising her family. This type of continuing education is a typical example of the opportunities of seminars, trainings, and conferences usually offered in larger cities and medical centers. Persons attending these trainings typically bring back valuable information which they then present to colleagues, thus increasing the overall impact of the education. We are grateful to the generous individuals who support and contribute to such endeavors. They truly make a difference.

Hospital employees should be aware of the availability of these monies for worthwhile pursuits, regardless of the size or length of the educational endeavor, assistance may be available. Her father, a "stubborn German" was a finish carpenter. Her mother, a "fiery Irishwoman" was a stay at home mom . Quite a combination! As an eighth grade graduate of Holy Angels parochial school, Betty earned a four-year scholarship to Cecilian Acad-



emy where she became student body president and then valedictorian. Subsequently, she received a four-year scholarship to Mount St. Joseph College in Chestnut Hill, Pennsylvania where she majored in education and music. She later furthered her music and singing while studying with Margarite Barr at the Conservatory of Music in Philadelphia.

After singing the "Blue Danube" for Bishop Fulton J. Sheen's fifty-year jubilee, she has tried to follow his suggestion that she has a wonderful gift and should be sure to give it to God. Fortunately for all of us, she continues to sing at special occasions.

In 1960, Betty married in Philadelphia and moved a great deal with a family of three children. After a move to San Clemente, she divorced in 1964 and began work in newspaper advertising. Later, serving as the membership director of the Chula Vista Chamber of Commerce, she tripled the membership! In 1971, Betty met Don Kaae, a project manager for Guy F. Atkinson and a father of four. With their marriage, they created a family with seven children. Don and the family moved to Saudi Arabia when he became general manager at Tamimi-Fouad Construction Company for a ten-year stint living in Al-Karbar. Betty was hired by the US AIR Force as an active duty aid and secretary to the Logistics manager at Dharan Air Base. Although Don's oldest daughter remained in the US, their two older daughters attended a Swiss school in Montreux while the younger children attended the Saudi Arabia International School.

The family made good use of their years abroad traveling throughout Europe and the East. While there, Betty began raising and showing registered Persian cats. She credits that experience in developing her language skills (French, German, and "Switzer") and making many good connections.

The Norovirus is a cause of gastroenteritis that is usually selflimiting. Symptoms include: fever, nausea, vomiting, cramping, malaise and diarrhea. It typically lasts between 24 to 72 hours, but may persist up to 5 days. The incubation period is about 12 hours after exposure. It is transmitted either by consumption of contaminated food, drinking contaminated water or by direct person-to-person spread.

The Norovirus is highly contagious. As few as 10 viral particles may be sufficient to infect an individual. Evidence suggests that immunity may be strain-specific and lasts only a few months. Because of the mutation that occurs within viruses, individuals are likely to be repeatedly infected throughout their lifetimes.

The virus can remain in a dried state at room temperature for up to 21-28 days and remain viable in carpeting as well as on computer mice, keyboards, and telephones up to 72 hours. The best way to prevent getting infected is to maintain good hand hygiene—sound familiar?

So remember: Cover Your Cough and Wash Your Hands frequently to prevent getting sick and may you have a very healthy and prosperous New Year!
